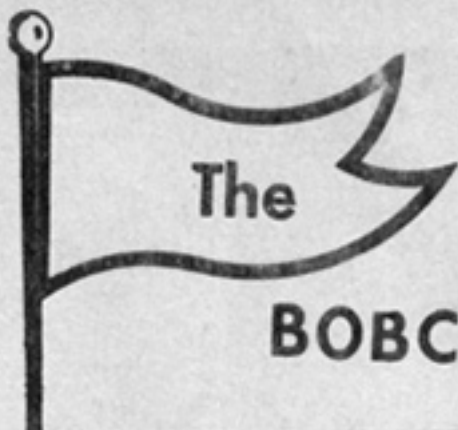
SENIOR WINS SALES DEMONSTRATION CONTEST

First Honorable Mention was given to Collette Schulte, senior, in a combination objective-essay contest. Vivian Craghan of St. Michael's High School, Davison was also awarded Honorable Mention.

Michigan will have entrants in national competition for a \$400 United Nations Association Award or an \$800 Dag Hammarskjeld Award. Jim's test is now entered in competition for these prizes.

Grand Blanc High School was allowed to submit two winners. In high school judging Colette placed first and Jim second. The contest was administered in early March by the Social Studies Department. Two awards of ten and five dollars were made available by the high school Student Council.

The purpose of the contest is to have students become more thoroughly acquainted with an important public issue. The contest is sponsored by the United Nations Association and approved by the National Association of Secondary School Principals. Awards were presented April 10th at the University of Michigan.
